

## Activity 1

# Design a Newspaper Headline for your Crazy Good Idea!

### Narrative

Imagine, you're a young inventor. You've had a brilliant idea and designed something revolutionary that will have a big, crazy good impact on the world and solve a problem you care about. Great job! And guess what else? A newspaper has decided to publish a story about your design.

How exciting! But let's take a step back for a minute.

This great idea you've created needs to have positive impact on people and community.

What is an issue that you really care about? What problem would like to solve that you think will help those around you? The sky is the limit. Remember, you're the inventor here!

### Pop-Out Activity

To help you come up with that crazy good idea, we suggest you work through the activity below. By following these simple steps, you will arrive at an idea you're both excited and passionate about!

1. Select a theme that interests you (LGBTQI+ issues, climate change, health and wellbeing, etc.) and have a quick scan online for inspiration to see what other people are doing/saying to make a difference around this issue/theme.
2. Put your crazy good thinking hat on! Grab 5-10 sticky notes (or pieces of paper) and write 1 idea on each note about how you could address your overarching issue/theme.
3. From these ideas, go through each one and ask yourself 'if this idea existed, how would it help the community?' Write down your response for each.
4. Select your favourite idea. Think about which of these ideas would be the most exciting to work on and would have a positive impact in the world.

## Activity Steps

### Activity 1a:

Some questions to think about include:

- How will the idea you've created help to solve this issue?
- Who are two types of people (user groups with different circumstances) that will benefit from this idea?

### Example

1. If I invented a wristband that detects for sugar imbalance in diabetics, people with diabetes will benefit because they will know when they need insulin or sugar - (that's one user group). But it will also help doctors because it will ease the strain on medical resources – (that's a second user group).
  2. If I invented a fire barrier which people could place around their bonfires, and which also extinguishes the fire if it spreads beyond the barrier, it could reduce the risk of bushfires which benefits fire-women and men because they will be less at risk during fire season – (that's one user group). But it also benefits farmers, because they are less likely to have their properties burn down – (that's a second user group).
- What makes your idea/design different from the ideas that already exist?
  - And the big one... What would the title of the newspaper article be?

As you brainstorm, write down on a piece of paper any thoughts that come to mind. There are no right or wrong answers.

### **Handy tips**

The sky is the limit in this activity. Don't worry if your idea seems crazy – we call them crazy good ideas for a reason!

Remember, there's no right or wrong. Work through each section of the activity, one at a time – if it feels challenging, just know that this a completely natural part of the process.
